The Murray State Police Department is located at the corner of North 16th and Chestnut Streets and is open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. The department, under the administration of the Vice President for Finance and Administrative Services, is responsible for police and parking services on Murray State University property. The mission of the Murray State Police Department, in cooperation with the University community, is to provide an orderly environment conducive for students to learn while also assuring the safety and protection of the students, faculty, staff and visitors.

CRIME REPORTING POLICY AND PROCEDURE

Crime Reporting

Murray State University has always been and continues to be committed to maintaining a safe, secure and orderly environment for all members and visitors to campus. In conformity with KRS 164.948 to 164.9489 and 20 USC 1092 (f), information about crimes that occur on University property, public property contiguous thereto, or on property owned or controlled by an officially recognized student organization should be reported to the Murray State Police Department at 270.809.2222. Similarly, campus security authorities, as defined by law, shall immediately forward reports of such crimes to the Murray State Police.

REPORTING CRIME AND EMERGENCIES

Students, faculty, staff and visitors to campus are encouraged to report emergencies and criminal activity accurately and promptly to the Murray State Police Department. To report an emergency, dial 911 from any campus telephone or push the button on an emergency call box. Emergency call boxes connect directly to the Police Department when the button is pushed. Officers are immediately dispatched to the site of any complaint. Criminal activity can also be reported in person at the Murray State Police Department. It is important to report crime and cooperate with police so proper investigation can occur. Anonymous crime reports may be sent to Murray State Police, 101 Public Safety Building, Murray, KY 42071.

You may also report a crime to a Campus Security Authority, some of which are: Residential College Advisors, Residential College Directors, Athletics Coaches, and Student Affairs staff (a complete list is available at www.murraystate.edu/ Campus Security Authorities). Campus Security Authorities must immediately report crimes they have personally observed or have been reported to them. The Handbook for Campus Safety and Security published by the U. S. Department of Education notes on page 76: "The function of a campus security authority is to report to the official or office designated by the institution to collect crime report information ... " It is preferable that Campus Security Authorities report the suspected crime by completing a General Incident Reporting Form (which can be found at www.murraystate.edu/ Libraries/PublicSafety/General_Incident_Reporting_ Form.sflb.ashx) and faxing it to Murray State Police at 270.809.3692. If the form is not used, Campus Security Authorities must call MSU Police (2222) to report. If a Campus Security Authority's area has directed that the form be used, please follow those directions. Likewise, hearsay reports of crime are to be immediately reported to the MSU Police Department.

If you are the victim of a crime and do not want to pursue action within the University system or criminal justice system, you may still want to consider making a confidential report. With your permission, the Chief or designee of MSU Police can file a report on the details of the incident without revealing your identity. The purpose of a confidential report is to comply with your wish to keep the matter confidential. Reports filed in this manner as well as crimes made known to a Campus Security Authority or reported by a third party, victim, offender, or witness of crimes are included in the campus crime statistics.

Pastoral counselors and professional counselors, while functioning within the scope of their license or certification, are not Campus Security Authorities. However, they are encouraged to inform the victim they are counseling that the victim may report crimes on a voluntary, confidential basis as described. These confidential reports will be included in the annual disclosure of crime statistics.

We strongly encourage adherence to all University, local, state and federal laws and rules of conduct to assure maximum safety and security.

Weapons and dangerous materials are prohibited on all property owned or controlled by Murray State University. This prohibition encompasses, but is not limited to, outdoor areas, classrooms, laboratories, residential colleges and other living facilities, office buildings, performance halls and auditoria, museums, dining facilities, athletics and recreational facilities and arenas, farms, parking lots and vehicles on property owned or controlled by Murray State. Annual Crime Awareness and Campus Security Report

Murray State Police, with the assistance of other departments within the University, prepares the annual report in compliance with federal and state law. Statistics are compiled from reports made directly to University Police or other Campus Security Authorities. Information regarding campus disciplinary referrals is obtained from Housing and Student Affairs.

Information about crimes occurring at off-campus property owned, leased, or controlled by Murray State University is solicited from the respective police agencies. Data received from these sources is compiled with and included in the annual disclosure of crime statistics.

Special Reports of Crime

A timely warning will be made to the campus when any crime reported to University or local police presents a safety or security threat to the University

community. The timely warning will be made as soon as facts are known, or within 24 hours after an incident is first reported, and will be in a manner that will aid in the prevention of similar occurrences. A campus-wide e-mail, posting of a flier at each Residential College, mobile alerts, and issuing a MSU News Bureau release will be used.

Murray State University has recently updated the outdoor warning system to include speakers that use both siren and voice directions. The university also has implemented a program to use the oncampus phones as a means of distributing emergency information through voice through the external phone speaker and text through the phone display. A text message notification system is also available for members of the university community. This is available as an "opt-in" feature through the MSU "MyGate" system.

The Murray State Police maintains all required logs and makes timely warnings of crimes determined to present a safety or security threat to the campus community. The Murray State Police Department, under the direction of the Vice President for Finance and Administrative Services, with such assistance as they deem necessary, will maintain, revise, and disseminate timely warnings as required.

SECURITY AND ACCESS TO CAMPUS FACILITIES

Students, faculty and staff have access to academic, recreational and administrative facilities on campus. The general public also has access to these facilities and often uses the University libraries, student center, recreational facilities and venues where concerts, sporting events and other special events are conducted. As described below, security in the residential colleges is much different and access to the residential colleges is very limited.

The Facilities Management Department maintains University buildings and grounds with a concern for safety and security. Facilities Management personnel regularly inspect for and repair potential safety and security hazards as well as responding to reports of such potential hazards.

The University is well lighted and further lighting improvements are made regularly. Lighting includes high-density sodium-vapor lights or metal halide lights on buildings, in parking lots, in areas of heavy landscaping, and along pedestrian pathways. Emergency call boxes are located throughout the residential and academic areas of campus.

SECURITY IN RESIDENTIAL AREAS

Murray State University maintains nine coed Residential Colleges and one female-only Residential College. For proper and safe building maintenance, access to each Residential College is restricted to residents and their properly signedin/supervised guests. Electronic card locks limit door access to each Residential College. Housing staff and closed-circuit cameras monitors these entrances.

A Residential Advisor is on duty each night in each building. Housing Security Guards are assigned to each desk during late-evening and night hours. During the evening, rounds are conducted to monitor activities in each building as well as to ensure that the exterior doors are secured.

Each Residential College is staffed with a Residential Director and numerous Residential Advisors (at least one per floor), each of whom live in their respective College. As part of their responsibility for security, all Residential College staff are empowered and trained in enforcing Residential College security policies.

During break periods such as Spring Break and Summer Break, every attempt is made to secure unoccupied Residential Colleges. During these break periods, students remaining on campus are relocated to a central Residential College that can be monitored by Housing Security Guards.

The College Courts Apartments provide onebedroom and two-bedroom units for married, single parent and non-traditional students.

LAW ENFORCEMENT AUTHORITY AND INTERAGENCY RELATIONSHIPS

The Murray State Police have the responsibility for law enforcement and criminal investigations on Murray State University property. Police Officers are responsible for a full range of services, including the enforcement of university, state, and federal laws, investigating reports of crime, filing crime reports, working traffic accidents, and responding to medical and fire emergencies. Murray State Police Officers are empowered as Peace Officers through the Board of Regents under the authority of Kentucky Revised Statute 164.

Officers have formal law enforcement authority, including the authority to arrest individuals, on property owned or controlled by the University and on streets running through and adjacent to the campus. They are also empowered to conduct investigations anywhere in the Commonwealth of Kentucky for crimes originating on campus. Pursuant to KRS 164.955, the Murray State Police has entered into a Jurisdictional Agreement with the Sheriff of Calloway County, Kentucky and the City of Murray Police Department whereby the Murray State Police jurisdiction is established to the extent of the county lines of Calloway County, Kentucky. The Murray State Police investigates all reports of crime on campus and, therefore, does not have a written Memorandum of Understanding with any local law enforcement agency for the investigation of certain crimes on campus.

Officers are trained according to Kentucky Law Enforcement Council standards, which include

attending the 18-week basic-training academy and 40 hours of annual in-service. Additional training is conducted in first aid, CPR, emergency responses, firearms and other topics as needed.

Officers work closely with local, state and federal law enforcement and emergency services agencies in an effort to provide services to the university community. Crime-related information and reports are routinely exchanged, including information related to off-campus locations owned, leased, or controlled by University student organizations. Crime reports are submitted to the Kentucky State Police and Federal Bureau of Investigation monthly, using National Incident Based Reporting standards. Murray State Police routinely solicits information for crimes occurring on property owned, leased, or controlled by the University from local and state agencies.

The Murray State Police Department also manages a select number of students known as Racer Patrol. Racer Patrol provide escorts, ensure facility security, and perform surveillance during the hours of 7 p.m. to 1 a.m. daily.

SECURITY AND SAFETY INFORMATION

As part of the University's security and safety information program, Murray State Police conducts a variety of educational programs for students and employees. Examples include meeting with prospective students and parents during Summer Orientation sessions, meetings with faculty and staff during Academic College meetings, and general sessions throughout the year to which the campus community is invited. These programs include general information on the safety and security of the campus as well as prevention and reporting of crime. Additionally, more specialized sessions are presented on the prevention and reporting of sexual offenses, general crime prevention and reporting, and numerous personal safety concerns. Information is also published and disseminated regularly via campus-wide e-mail, flyers, posters, brochures, newsletters, local news media, and University news media.

Safety and security related programs are part of the many programs coordinated by Housing staff throughout the academic year. Officers participate in presenting these programs. Other campus groups also sponsor educational programs such as alcohol and drug abuse prevention.

Security Awareness Programs include:

Escort service- This service provides escorts on campus in an attempt to encourage students, faculty, staff, and visitors to not walk alone. Escorts are primarily performed by Racer Patrol. However, if a request is received during a period of time when Racer Patrol is not on duty, an Officer will provide the escort.

Emergency Call Boxes- Emergency Call Boxes are

located throughout the Academic and Residential sides of campus as well as at the West Farm Complex. Each Call Box is connected directly to the Murray State Police Telecommunications Center and is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

Bicycle Registration- The Murray State Police conducts registration programs throughout the Residential College and College Courts Apartment Complexes throughout the year. Bicycle owners may also register their bicycles at the Murray State Police Department. Bicycle registration is provided free of charge. A database is maintained of registered bicycles and is used to identify found bicycles. Information of registered bicycles is also forwarded to the Murray Police Department.

Operation Identification- This is a theft prevention program offered by the Department that assists in marking and documenting serial numbers on personal property. During educational programs, Officers encourage theft prevention through recommended safe practices as well as information on how to report a theft.

Security Reviews- This is a service provided to the University community, including building and workspace reviews. This service is offered to extended campus locations as well.

Lighting Reviews- This is a multi-department service that is provided semi-annually. During this review, representatives from the Police Department, Facilities Management, Student Affairs, Student Government Association, and other faculty/staff groups review exterior lighting on campus. The review includes a comprehensive tour of the campus.

Crime Prevention Education- Educational programs on crime prevention are provided by the Department upon request. These programs promote awareness concerning personal safety as well as property protection. These programs are applicable throughout the entire campus.

Alcohol/Drug Awareness and Education-

Educational programs on alcohol/drug awareness, abuse, and consequences are provided by the Department upon request. These programs promote awareness concerning alcohol/drug abuse and consequences. Groups targeted are each Residential College, fraternities, sororities, and other student organizations. The use of "drunk goggles" as a tool to demonstrate alcohol impairment is a resource example.

Crime Stoppers- The Murray State Police Department participates in the local Crime Stoppers program. Crime Stoppers is a program to reward individuals for providing information leading to the arrest, indictment, and/or conviction of a person.

Campus Oriented Policing (COPS)- This is a philosophy based on community oriented policing strategies. It

includes involvement in Residential College and other campus group activities. Its goal is greater officer/campus community cooperation, which leads to increased prevention and solving of crimes on campus.

Internet Website- The Murray State Police website, located at www.murraystate.edu/publicsafety, provides information on matters of safety and security on campus.

DRUG-FREE CAMPUS/DRUG-FREE WORKPLACE POLICY

It is the policy of Murray State University that the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession, or use of controlled substances is prohibited in buildings, facilities, grounds, or property controlled by the University and/or while engaged in University business. It is also the policy of Murray State University to enforce Kentucky statutes concerning the possession, sale, distribution or use of alcoholic beverages. In addition, Murray State University specifically prohibits the possession or use of alcohol in the residence halls. Any enrolled student or any employee of the University, including faculty, staff, and student employees, found to be illegally manufacturing, distributing, or dispensing, possessing or using controlled substances, or found to be in violation of Kentucky statutes or University policy regarding the possession, sale, distribution or use of alcohol on University property, shall be subject to disciplinary action in accordance with applicable policies of Murray State University up to and including expulsion or termination of employment, and referral for prosecution. Satisfactory participation in certain drug abuse assistance or rehabilitation programs may be required in certain cases.

Students and employees are reminded that illegal manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession or use of controlled substances, or illegal possession, sale, distribution or use of alcohol, may also subject individuals to criminal prosecution. In appropriate cases, referrals will be made to outside law enforcement agencies. Murray State University reserves the right to pursue disciplinary action, however, independent of criminal disposition.

As a condition of employment, all employees of Murray State University shall abide by the terms of this policy statement and will notify Murray State University of any criminal drug statute conviction for a violation occurring in the workplace no later than five days after such conviction. Murray State University will, in turn, notify as appropriate, the applicable federal agency of the conviction within ten (10) days of its receipt of notification of the conviction. For purposes of this policy, "conviction" means a finding of guilt (including a plea of nolo contendere or an "Alford" plea). Appropriate personnel action, up to and including termination, will be taken against any employee with such a conviction. Alternatively, such employee may be required to participate in a proper

drug abuse assistance or rehabilitation program.

All employees and students will annually receive written notice of this policy including sanctions under

written notice of this policy including sanctions under law for unlawful possession or distribution of illicit drugs and alcohol; a description of the health risks associated with the use of illicit drugs and the abuse of alcohol; and a description of any drug or alcohol counseling, treatment, or rehabilitation or re-entry programs that are available to employees or students.

A description of drug and alcohol abuse education programs is available through the Office of Student Affairs and/or Human Resources. Murray State's policy on drugs and alcohol can be found in the Student Life Handbook and through Human Resources.

The dangers of drug abuse in the workplace as well as the health risks associated with the use of illicit drugs and the abuse of alcohol include, but are not limited to, marked changes in behavior, aggressive acts, impaired judgment and coordination, and impairments of higher mental functions. Additional information about the health risks of drug and alcohol abuse is available at Health Services. Also, University Counseling Services provides educational programming including discussion, videotapes, and printed material to campus groups such as Housing staff, social organizations, and staff groups.

Sanctions for unlawful possession or distribution of illicit drugs can range from up to 45 days in jail for unlawful Possession of Marijuana (a class B misdemeanor) to up to 10 years in prison for Trafficking in a Controlled Substance 1st degree (a class C felony).

Sanctions for unlawful possession or distribution of alcohol can range from a \$250 fine for Possession of Alcohol by a Minor (persons under age 21), to up to 1 year in jail for Unlawful Transaction with a Minor 3rd degree (a class A misdemeanor).

University Counseling Services (270.809.6851) provides limited personal counseling at no cost to students and employees with abuse/addiction problems. The services offered to employees are a part of the Employee Assistance Program. The Center also provides limited counseling for the families of student/employee drug abusers. Some cases requiring more intensive therapy are referred to the Psychological Center (270.809.2504), whose services are also free to students. Referrals for therapy and rehabilitation are also made to the off-campus agencies or services nearby, including 12-Step Recovery Groups, Murray-Calloway County Hospital (270.762.1100), or local hospital or emergency health care provider, Four Rivers Behavioral Health (270.753.6622), or local mental health care provider, and other agencies. There may be costs associated with such referrals.

SEXUAL OFFENSES POLICY STATEMENT

Murray State University expressly condemns sexual offenses committed by or against any member of

the campus community. It is the responsibility of the President working through the Vice Presidents, to ensure that the campus community is properly educated regarding matters which include programs available which promote the awareness of rape, acquaintance rape, and other forcible and nonforcible sexual offenses. Kentucky law also prohibits such conduct. Perpetrators of this behavior are subject to criminal, civil and university penalties.

The University is committed to the elimination of sexual offenses on campus by means of preventive educational programs, victim's advocacy, and strict enforcement of the sexual assault policy. The Murray State Police Department offers a program on rape and sexual assault awareness, when requested.

The following procedures are recommended for victims of sexual offenses:

- Contact the Murray State Police immediately. Also consider contacting a close friend, a Residential Advisor, MSU Women's Center, or the Purchase Area Sexual Assault Center for support.
- 2. Do not bathe, douche, or remove clothing.
- Obtain an examination at the Hospital Emergency Room for sexually transmitted diseases, pregnancy, unnoticed injuries, and evidence to be used if you decide to take legal action.
- 4. If you choose not to contact the Murray State Police, contact the Purchase Area Sexual Assault Center or MSU Women's Center to complete an anonymous sexual assault reporting form to assist in preventing future victims.
- 5. Seek counseling.

Services available to victims of sexual offenses include, but are not limited to:

- > Murray State Police Department: 911 or 270.809.2222. The Murray State Police Department will assist victims by helping to immediately ensure a safe and secure environment. The MSU Women's Center or Purchase Area Sexual Assault Center will be contacted for victim support. A criminal investigation will also be initiated. The Murray State Police Department will also assist victims in notifying other local and/or state law enforcement agencies as necessary and requested.

> MSU Women's Center: 270.809.3140. Center staff and volunteers will provide crisis counseling information and advocacy for victims of sexual

offenses. Staff will also accompany victims to hearings and meetings with police or other officials. The Center will also provide support to friends and family of victims as well as educational programs for students, faculty, and staff. In addition, it provides a variety of preventive programs throughout the academic year, such as self-defense workshops and presentations dealing with gender relations, acquaintance rape, and incest.

- > Purchase Area Sexual Assault Center: 270.753.5777 (Murray), 270.534.4422 (Paducah) or 1.800.928.7273. The Purchase Area Sexual Assault Center will provide support to victims of sexual offenses. Staff will also perform victim's advocate functions as needed.
- > University Counseling Services: 270.809.6851. University Counseling Services will provide psychotherapy for victims of sexual offenses.
- > Psychological Center: 270.809.2504. The Psychological Center will provide psychotherapy for victims of sexual offenses.
- > Health Services: 270.809.3809. Health Services will provide follow-up gynecological exam, pregnancy tests, and referrals. In addition, they are available to treat general injuries resulting from the assault.
- > **Housing: 270.809.2310.** Housing will provide Resident Advisors for immediate support to victims and referral. Housing is also available to assist victims in changing living situations on campus as requested.
- > **Student Affairs: 270.809.6831.** Student Affairs will provide assistance in changing the victim's academic situation, such as course selection, if changes are requested and available.
- > Sanctuary, Inc.: 1.800.766.0000. Sanctuary, Inc. will provide support to victims of sexual offenses in Hopkinsville, Madisonville and Fort Campbell. Staff will also perform victim's advocate functions as needed.
- > **New Beginnings: 1.800.226.7273.** New Beginnings will provide support to victims of sexual offenses in Henderson. Staff will also perform victim's advocate functions as needed.

The Office of Institutional Diversity, Equity, and Access will provide assistance to employees and students regarding MSU's policies and grievance procedures and will provide assistance in contacting MSU offices that provide support services to victims of sexual offenses.

The University has established procedures for addressing an alleged sex offense. Depending on the status of the perpetrator (employee, student, or visitor), there are several routes through which grievances may be filed. The following is a summary of these procedures:

- 1. If the alleged perpetrator is a student, the grievance should be filed with the University Judicial Board through the Office of Student Affairs (refer to Student Life Policies found at http://campus.murraystate.edu/services/ctcfiles/StuLifePolicies2010.pdf for procedures).
- If the alleged perpetrator is an employee or visitor, the grievance should be filed with the Office of Equal Opportunity.

The alleged victim and perpetrator are entitled to have others present during disciplinary proceedings. Both will also be notified of the outcome of campus disciplinary proceedings regarding sexual offenses. All sexual offenses are also punishable by law and victims are encouraged to contact the appropriate law enforcement agency in addition to pursuing the matter through the University system.

Due to the severity of the offense, individuals found to be in violation of this policy are subject to sanctions ranging from warning to expulsion or termination.

Murray State University will, upon written request, disclose to the alleged victim of any crime of violence, or a non-forcible sex offense, the results of any disciplinary proceeding conducted by the University against the student who is the alleged perpetrator of the crime or offense. If the alleged victim is deceased as a result of the crime or offense, the University will provide the results of the disciplinary hearing to the victim's next of kin, if requested.

WETTERLING ACT COMPLIANCE SEX OFFENDER REGISTRY

Compliant with provisions of the Wetterling Act as amended October 28, 2000, by the Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act of 2000 (CSCPA), the Murray State University Police Department provides an Internet link to the Kentucky State Police Sex Offender Registry. EMERGENCY RESPONSE, EVACUATION AND NOTIFICATION

In the event of a serious incident which poses an immediate threat to members of the Murray State University community, the University has various

systems in place for communicating information quickly to those individuals. Some or all of these methods of communication may be activated in the event of an immediate threat to the Murray State University community. These methods of communication include emails, mobile alerts, outdoor warning speakers, indoor phone speakers, indoor phone displays and a link to emergency information on MSU's homepage.

All members of the Murray State University community are notified on an annual basis that they are required to notify the Murray State Police Department of any situation or incident on campus that involves a significant emergency or dangerous situation that may involve an immediate or ongoing threat to the health and safety of students and/or employees on campus. Murray State Police Department has the responsibility of responding to, and summons the necessary resources, to mitigate, investigate, and document any situation that may cause a significant emergency or dangerous situation. In addition, the Murray State Police Department has a responsibility to respond to such incidents and determine if the situation does in fact, pose a threat to the community. If that is the case, Federal Law requires that the institution immediately notify the campus community or the appropriate segments of the community that may be affected by the situation.

If the Murray State Police Department confirms that there is an emergency or dangerous situation that poses an immediate threat to the health or safety of some or all members of the Murray State University community, it will collaborate with the Office of the Vice President for Finance and Administrative Services (VPFAS) to determine the content of the message and will use some or all of the systems described above to communicate the threat to the Murray State University community or to the appropriate segment of the community, if the threat is limited to a particular building or segment of population. The Murray State Police Department and the Office of the VPFAS will, without delay and taking into account the safety of the community, determine the content of the notification and initiate the notification system, unless issuing a notification will, in the judgment of the first responders (including, but not limited to: Murray State Police Department, Murray Police Department, Murray Fire Department, and Murray-Calloway County Ambulance Service), compromise the efforts to assist a victim or to contain, respond to, or otherwise mitigate the emergency. Follow up information will also be disseminated as needed by all or some of these systems.

Murray State University tests its emergency response and evacuation procedures on an annual basis. This test is documented at the Murray State Police Department with details including the date, time and whether it was announced or unannounced. Murray State University will utilize on campus media outlets, such as email, newspaper, and distribution of flyers to publicize emergency response and evacuation procedures in conjunction with the annual test.

MISSING STUDENT POLICY

The following table shows,

If a member of the University community has reason to believe that a student who resides in on-campus housing is missing, he or she should immediately notify the Murray State Police Department at 270.809.2222. The Murray State Police will generate a missing person report and initiate an investigation.

After investigating the missing person report, should the Murray State Police Department determine that the student is missing and has been missing for more than 24 hours, Murray State will notify the Murray Police Department and the student's emergency contact no later than 24 hours after the student is determined to be missing. If the missing student is under the age of 18 and is not an emancipated

individual, Murray State will notify the student's custodial parent or legal guardian immediately after Murray State Police Department has determined that the student has been missing for more than 24 hours.

In addition to registering an emergency contact, students residing in on-campus housing have the option to identify confidentially an individual to be contacted by Murray State in the event the student is determined to be missing for more than 24 hours. If a student has identified such an individual, Murray State will notify that individual no later than 24 hours after the student is determined to be missing. Contact information is accessible only to authorized campus officials and law enforcement and may not be disclosed outside of a missing person investigation.

Annual Fire Safety Report 2013

The Student Life Handbook contains a section entitled "Emergency Procedures" that includes Fire Emergency Instructions.

In case of a fire:

- · Sound the fire alarm
- Call the Fire Department (911)
- Call the hall desk or staff member on duty in hall
- Remain calm and act quickly
- Wear protective clothing such as a coat and shoes, and carry a damp towel for use in heavy smoke.
- Close the room door and windows
- Walk in an orderly manner to the nearest exit.
 NEVER USE AN ELEVATOR.
- Move a safe distance away from the building and out of the way of fire department personnel.
- Remain outside until told by the hall staff to return.

If you think there is a fire in the hallway, you should feel the door before opening it.

- If the door does not feel hot, open it slightly, holding your head away and bracing the door with your foot.
- Put your hand across the opening to test the heat of the air.
- If the door is hot and the hallway unsafe, stop up any opening or cracks through which smoke may enter, using wet towels, sheets, blankets, etc.
- If smoke does enter the room, open the window for ventilation; break it if it is sealed.
- Do not jump; make your presence known by hanging a sheet or a piece of clothing from your window and wait for rescue.

In case of a minor fire:

- Pull the fire alarm.
- Use a wastebasket full of water, a fire extinguisher, or a blanket to smother out the fire.
- Do not use water on an electrical or grease fire!
- Call the staff member on duty in your hall.
- Never risk your personal safety!

The "Emergency Procedures Guide" which has been widely distributed to faculty and staff and which is also available on the MSU webpage at http://www.murraystate.edu/EmergencyProcedures contains a Fire section which outlines the following procedures to be followed:

- Smoke, fire or an explosion in a building shall warrant activation of the nearest fire alarm pull station which is located near an outside exit.
- Call MSU Police at 911 (on campus phones ONLY). If there is no answer, or if the line is busy, call 2222, or 270.809.2222 if calling from a cell phone. Immediately evacuate the

- building using established evacuation routes. Do not use elevators.
- If possible, provide assistance to mobilityimpaired individuals. If this is not possible, or if anyone is injured, call MSU Police at 911. Provide the location to arriving emergency services (fire, police, etc.) of physically impaired individuals.
- 4. Do not attempt to extinguish fire.
- Once outside the building, account for all building occupants at the designated meeting area.
- Do not re-enter the building or leave the campus unless told to do so by the building coordinator, department chair, or MSU Police.
- 7. Report damage to Facilities Management at 4291.
- 8. Give any known details of the alarm or fire to arriving emergency personnel.

Each building on campus has a designated Building Coordinator. The Building Coordinator Program incorporates a yearly review with building occupants of evacuation procedures. This program is administered by the Department of Public Safety and Emergency Management.

Reports of fires on campus should be immediately made to the Murray State Police Department. The Murray State Police Department can be reached by dialing 911 or 2222 from any on-campus phone. If using an off campus (or cell) phone, the Murray State Police Department can be reached by dialing 270.809.2222.

While MSU continually evaluates fire safety and preparedness, no other future improvements in fire safety have been identified by the institution. If or when a need for improvement is identified, MSU will place a priority on making the necessary changes.

These are incidents already reported in various crime categories that also fall into one of the reportable categories as required by KRS 164.948(3), or other incidents in which the victim was intentionally selected because of an actual or perceived prejudice.
