Kelly Taylor:

What or who motivated you to persist through college to earn your degree?

• My parents were definitely my primary motivation to not only persist but also excel through college and onward into my graduate studies and professional career. Since I was young, they instilled the values of education and intellect, therefore, promoting a natural, built-in motivation that I carried with me while at Murray State. Along with valuing academic performance and knowledge obtainment, my internal motivation to serve and be an impactful campus leader, supplemented my motivation to remain and thrive as a Racer. The encouragement and relationships I gained from other students, faculty, and staff not only afforded me the opportunity to flourish on campus, but continued to persist beyond graduation through lifelong friendships, dedicated mentorships, and professional connections that undoubtedly solidified the foundation of my career and adult life.

What advice would you give other first-generation students?

• Explore! Ask questions! Try new things! Get involved! The classroom is a very important aspect of college but it should not be the entire experience. I encourage students to explore the various student organizations on campus – this is where you find "your people." I was personally involved in SGA, Greek Life, and my pre-professional club but I assure you that there is an organization for every student at Murray State. Ask questions to learn more about these organizations and then jump in and try something. Once you have found the right one(s) for you, lean into being an active member and leader of that organization. Additionally, I highly recommend students to be proactive and utilize the various resources on campus to be successful. Ask questions and build relationships with your academic advisor and professors. Check out services and opportunities offered through the library and Career Services. Being a first-generation college student may mean that we do not have all of the answers when we first step onto campus, but we certainly have the power to obtain those answers once we get there.

What advice would you give other first-generation students?

Join an organization, contribute to the goals of the group, and do your best to become a leader. If you aren't sure what to join, ask fellow students and faculty/staff members for direction. You'll know when you've found the right organization to serve- when you find it, jump in head-first.
