U.S. News & World Report ranks Murray State University among 2024-2025 Best Graduate Schools

Murray State University has recently been ranked among the 2024-2025 Best Graduate Schools for six programs: Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP), as well as the Nurse Anesthesia option within the DNP, Master of Arts in English, Master of Public Administration (MPA), Master of Science in Occupational Therapy (MSOT) and Master of Science in Speech-Language Pathology by *U.S. News & World Report*.

These recognitions were added to Murray State's ranking last fall as one of the top schools in the country in multiple categories, marking the institution's 33rd consecutive year of top-tier rankings by the reputable college guide.

Designed for prospective students looking to further their education beyond college, the Best Graduate Schools rankings evaluate programs in a variety of disciplines including business, education, engineering, law, medicine and nursing.

By collecting graduate school data annually, *U.S. News* is able to present the most current figures on enrollment, job placement, faculty and other critical quality indicators that help prospective students make informed decisions.

First-generation Murray State students in London

Grant funds opportunity for 18 first-generation Murray State University students to study abroad in London over spring break

Eighteen first-year, first-generation Murray State University students had the opportunity to study theater and media literacy in London over spring break thanks to the Kentucky Innovative Scholarship Pilot Program, a grant program run by the Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education and the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority.

Developing new ways to help first-generation students succeed at Murray State is especially important, according to Jennifer Smith, assistant director of Murray State's Center for Student Engagement and Success, because 41 percent of Murray's undergraduate population are first-generation college students. This percentage is higher than most other comparable schools. The success of one first-generation student can have profound ripple effects for an entire family, changing that family's educational and economic trajectory for generations.

Of the 18 students who were part of the program, half were enrolled in THD 104, The Theatrical Experience, with Professor David Balthrop, dean of the College of Humanities and Fine Arts, and the other half were enrolled in JMC 168, Media Literacy and Society, with Dr. Marcie Hinton, associate professor of public relations. The two classes traveled through London together. Each class spent the first part of the semester preparing for the London experience, and spent time in the second part of the semester processing and reflecting on it.

Some of the highlights of the program included touring Windsor Castle, attending shows on the West End, seeing the Roman Baths in Bath, visiting Stonehenge, riding the Tube, visiting museums such as the Victoria and Albert Museum, trying new foods, exploring St. Paul's Cathedral, taking the Warner Bros. Harry Potter Studio Tour and even just walking around the city.



Murray State University's Office of the Provost awarded \$1.5 million Department of Energy grant

Murray State University's Office of the Provost was recently awarded a \$1.5 million grant by the Department of Energy (DOE) from May 1, 2024, to Sept. 30, 2028, to support the efficient and effective work consistent with the environmental cleanup and beneficial reuse of the Paducah Gaseous Diffusion Plant site.

The project goal is to develop information that the DOE's Portsmouth/Paducah Project Office (PPPO), its contractors and the public can use in decision-making for the environmental cleanup, beneficial reuse and public outreach at the Paducah site.

"The Murray State University/Department of Energy grant allows collaborative work with industry, community, K-12 and postsecondary education for connected study involving reuse of the land at the Paducah Gaseous Diffusion site," said Murray State Associate Provost Dr. Renee Fister. 
The project will focus on site repurposing, STEM activities in local high schools and public outreach as well as scholarship and creative activities for faculty and students.


