City of Murray ranks 4th nationally in *USA Today*'s Best Small College Towns

The city of Murray was recently ranked among the top four small college towns in the United States, according to a *USA Today* online readers poll. Murray was among the 20 towns nominated for Best Small College Towns in the *USA Today* 10 Best Readers' Choice Awards.

"The worlds of Murray, Kentucky, and Murray State University have been intertwined since the college opened in 1922 in the heart of town," reads *USA Today*'s website's description. "As a quintessential college town, Murray has lots of pubs and bars, casual restaurants run by local owners and outdoor outfitters to keep everyone enjoying the local parks which offer amenities like disc golf, a skate park and a huge soccer complex. Non-collegiate visitors love the famed Calloway County Quilt Trail, which features more than 60 quilt patterns painted on barns, homes and other buildings throughout the countryside."

Murray Convention & Visitors Bureau Executive Director Erin Carrico said the admiration between the University and its hometown runs deep.

region benefit. Keep it up!"


Calloway County Judge Executive

Historic season shines light on Racer Athletics, Murray State University and the campus community

Murray State Baseball's historic run to the 2025 College World Series in Omaha provided an unprecedented amount of exposure and brand awareness for the Racers, shining a national spotlight on the growth and forward momentum of the Department of Athletics, the University and the Murray-Calloway County community.

Over the course of the baseball postseason, spanning from the Racers winning the Missouri Valley



Conference Tournament through their run at the College World Series, Murray State generated a 44.3 billion Total Media Reach per Meltwater, an online media, social and consumer intelligence company that is partnered with the University. This figure includes all impressions through news,

print, broadcast and certain social media platforms.

The total media reach figure was met through more than 17,100 total mentions across online news, social media and TV and radio broadcasts. Major platforms to mention Murray State included MSN.com, USA Today, Yahoo! Sports, Sports Illustrated, ESPN, ESPN Radio and more.

As a result of this exposure, it is projected that Murray State received \$406 million in Advertising Value Equivalency, which approximates the monetary value of earned media efforts by comparing them to the equivalent cost of placing advertisements.



"We would like to

congratulate the Racer Baseball program on their historic run to the College World Series and thank them for their role in putting a national spotlight on Murray State University and Murray, Kentucky," President Dr. Ron Patterson said. "Murray State truly is the finest place we know, and we hope that this extraordinary exposure for our institution has highlighted the great people and programs we have as part of our campus community for prospective students, faculty and staff."

Murray State Baseball set a program record for wins during the 2025 season with 44, claiming the Missouri Valley Conference Regular Season and Tournament Championship along the way. The Racers were then selected to the Oxford Regional, where they defeated Georgia Tech and hosts Ole Miss twice before travelling to Durham for a Super Regional, where the team topped Duke in three games.

2025 Kentucky legislative session includes continued support for Murray State University to pursue a School of Veterinary Medicine

Murray State University's exploration of a School of Veterinary Medicine received a strong showing of support in the 2025 Kentucky legislative session.

Senate Bill 77, which was passed unanimously by both chambers in a bipartisan manner and was signed into law by Governor Andy Beshear, continues to provide a path forward for the University to establish a new Doctorate in Veterinary Medicine at Murray State.

Said Murray State University Hutson School of Agriculture Dean Dr. Brian Parr: "This is a very exciting time for the agriculture industry in the Commonwealth of Kentucky! There is no doubt that this effort represents a needed advancement in educational opportunities for our students that will pay immeasurable dividends in the future in terms of employment opportunities, animal health care and the advancement of the animal agriculture industry in our state. I am very thankful to our legislators who recognized this need and the potential solution offered through establishing a School of Veterinary Medicine here at Murray State University!"

According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS), there are 86,300 veterinarians in the United States and this occupation is expected to grow by over 19 percent by 2031. The BLS also reports a total of 122,800 veterinarian technologists/technicians are working today and the field is expected to grow by 20 percent by 2031. Eighty of 120 counties across Kentucky have a veterinary shortage or are deemed underserved rural areas with low ratios of practicing veterinarians to livestock.

Murray State holds multiple existing assets on its campus, as well as a new \$60 million Veterinary Sciences Building to be constructed. The University's Hutson School of Agriculture has the largest estimated pre-veterinary medicine/ veterinary technology enrollment of any university in Kentucky, and is just one of three programs in Kentucky that is fully accredited by the American Veterinary Medical Association.

A task force has been created for the planning and development of a School of Veterinary Medicine at Murray State University.



Murray State University helps develop patented technology for recycling multicomponent plastics

Dr. Kevin Miller (left), professor and chair of the Department of Chemistry at Murray State University, partnered with researchers at the University of Minnesota to develop technology for new multi-block

copolymer compatibilizers that improve the recyclability of mixed plastic waste streams.

The technology specifically targets streams that contain mixtures of polyesters such as polyethylene terephthalate (PET) and polyolefins such as polyethylene (PE), two of the most utilized commodity plastics, which together constitute 40-50 percent of all plastic waste globally.

Recycling of plastics in the U.S. remains at a surprisingly low level (less than 9 percent, according to a 2020 research article that Miller also contributed to, which can be found at **bit.ly/45QIB5j**) with most plastic waste ending up in landfills or being incinerated; therefore, there is a great deal of interest in exploring relatively inexpensive alternatives to current recycling technologies.

Polyolefins and polyesters such as PE and PET are commonly used in packaging, especially for food, in the form of films made up of layers of different types of plastics adhered together. These films are rarely recycled as the layers are extremely difficult to separate physically, and traditional melt reprocessing is not effective because liquefied PET and PE do not mix, resulting in reprocessed films which lack the necessary mechanical properties for reuse.

The new patented technology describes a process by which multi-block copolymers are used at low levels during melt processing to essentially "tie" the layers together like a piece of thread. The reprocessed films were found to exhibit stronger polyester/polyolefin interlayer adhesion than the original multi-layered material as demonstrated through the analysis of mechanical properties and scanning electron microscopy images taken after freeze-fracturing.

Overall, the technology represents a significant advancement in the recycling or upcycling of PET/PE waste streams through the melt blending of preformed multi-block compatibilizers. The technology could be applied to PET/PE mixed-plastic waste streams which are either impossible to physically separate through traditional melt reprocessing or too inconvenient to sort. Further, products where the multi-block compatibilizer is preloaded into the virgin material could make them ready for recycling after their initial use.

Support for the research was provided by the National Science Foundationsponsored Center for Sustainable Polymers at the University of Minnesota, and was completed in collaboration with Dr. Christopher Ellison, professor of chemical engineering and materials science at the University of Minnesota.
