




Enrollment

Overall, the College of Humanities and Fine Arts sustained enrollments from fall 2023 to fall 2024. However, at the graduate level, we had notable growth. As a college, we experienced an increase from 265 grad students in the fall of 2023 to 307 in the fall of 2024.






Above: CHFA graduate students celebrate the completion of their degree at the May 2025 Robing Ceremony in Lovett Auditorium.



- The Department of Psychology hosted a BBQ in the Quad to encourage students to meet with an academic advisor and schedule classes.



Faculty in CHFA had a prolific year of research and creative activity, with over 168 presentations, performances, awards and appointments external to Murray State University.



Art & Design

Professor Cintia Segovia Figueroa's work was in a juried regional art exhibition at CommonWealth at Eastern Kentucky University. She also had two photos included in the 36th Annual Juried Exhibition at the Texarkana Regional Arts Center and Humanities Council in Texas, and was part of a two-person art exhibition at Bolivar Art Gallery in University of Kentucky Bolivar Art Gallery at the University of Kentucky. She received a grant from the Kentucky Arts Council and the Kentucky Historical Society to present a new photography exhibition celebrating 250 years since the signing of the Declaration of Independence, served as a juror for two local art competitions and one at the University of Southern Indiana's 55th Annual Juried Student Art Exhibition at the Pace/McCutchen Galleries, served as co-organizer for the Society of Photographic Education Midwest Conference, took six students to the Society of Photographic Education Midwest conference (two presented their research), and gave a virtual invited talk/lecture to graduate level journalism students at California State University.

Professor Jim Bryant had work included in the exhibit *Future/Past/Presence* at the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art. He also juried the Paducah School of Art and Design student exhibit and gave a poster design workshop at the Paducah School of Art and Design (with three Murray State University student assistants).

Professor Scott Cook juried into the 6th imPressed: Don't Look Up! national juried printmaking exhibition at Art Gym Gallery in Denver, Colorado. His work was among only 27 selected from 599 submissions. He also juried into the 39th Positive/Negative National Juried Art Exhibition at ETSU's Slocomb Galleries in Johnson City, TN, one of only 39 works from 152 entries. He also served as a design consultant for Wits' End Records in Murray, KY.

Jessica Fife exhibited work in *Big Fish, Little Sea* Advanced Painting exhibition and in *Middle Of Nowhere* at the Adler Smith Gallery in Santa Monica, CA.

She was one of three juror panelists for the 62nd annual Juried Art Exhibition at the Owensboro Museum of Fine Art, Owensboro, KY. She also served as an peer reviewer for an article for *Museum Materials Discussions*, *Journal of Museum Studies*, and served as a mentor for a Wiki Education class project with a professor in New York City. In addition, her book, *Cold War American Exhibitions of Italian Art and Design: "Italy at Work: Her Renaissance in Design Today,"* was released in paperback by Routledge.





The College of Humanities and Fine Arts is the cultural hub of the region. 




Art & Design

One Spanish Major with a German Certificate was accepted to Dartmouth for a graduate program on fellowship.


