

Todd is originally from Paducah, KY and graduated from Reidland High School. He received his Bachelor of Science degree in Agribusiness Economics from Murray State University in 1990, and was also named the Outstanding Senior in Agriculture. While at MSU, Todd was active in a variety of academic and social organizations including Alpha Gamma Rho fraternity. In addition, he did completed coursework in Chemistry at the University of Louisville from 2000-2002. He attended Missouri Auction

Scott is a 2005 graduate of Murray State University. He was born and raised in Calloway County and graduated from Calloway County High School in 2000. While studying Agricultural Science Technology at MSU, Scott also began a farming operation that consisted of 2 acres of tobacco and 40 acres of soybeans. This operation has since grown to include 90 acres of dark fired tobacco and 500 acres of corn and soybeans, in addition to a commercial herd of black Angus cattle. Scott's operation has received many awards including the

GRANTS/GIVING

- Mr. Andy Buhler and his wife, Ginny signed a charitable trust fund over to Murray State University to benefit both the Hutson School of Agriculture and the men's basketball team. Both Mr. and Mrs. Buhler are graduates of MSU and want to make a difference for the future.
- The Arboretum at Murray State University hosted the inaugural Hutson Harvest Gala as a fundraising event to complete the mountain and pond exhibit. One hundred fifty guests gathered at the Arboretum and raised over \$11,000. Thanks in part to Hutson, Inc. tittle sponsorship of \$6,000, all proceeds from the evening heled to construct a pergola at the top of the mountain.

BREATHITT VETERINARY CENTER





The Breathitt Veterinary Center (BVC), located almost 60 miles away from main campus in Hopkinsville, KY is an important unit of the Hutson School of Agriculture. The BVC serves veterinary clinics and veterinarians far beyond the geographic portion of Kentucky where it is situated. In addition, the lab works with the MSU Animal Health Technology program to educate AHT and preveterinary medicine students.

This year had brought lots of changes and lots of excitement to the Breathitt Veterinary Center! Progress on the long awaited new BVC facility is on track to be completed in September 2016. Weather has been a challenge for the engineering firm, both winter and summer, but the walls continue to rise. The entire staff is waiting with anticipation occupying the new building, while the actual moving process is viewed with some anxiety.

Personnel:

- Dr. Debbie Reed was named Director of the Breathitt Veterinary Center as of January 2015. Dr. Reed had been the case coordinator at BVC for 9 years following an 18 year career as a mixed animal practitioner.
- Mr. John Goad, long time employee of Clinical Pathology, has retired to rake hay, feed cows, and play with grandchildren. The BVC will miss John and his ready smile and kind heart. We are working on getting this position posted to be filled.

Laboratory Improvements:

• The BVC raised over \$75,000 in grant funds in 2015 that were utilized for equipment upgrades, new equipment purchases and preventative maintenance. While we are set to move into a new building, the equipment that is used daily in diagnostics and surveillance activities will be moved with us. Upgrades and maintenance contracts are largely financed through grant activity, and the BVC regularly seeks out additional funding in this manner.

Operations:

- Almost 10,000 Coggins (EIA) tests were performed at the BVC in 2015.
- The BVC performed just under 12,000 diagnostic accessions during the past year.

WM. BILL CHERRY EXPO CENTER



Completed in 1976 and dedicated on May 21, 1977, the Western Kentucky Livestock Show and Exposition Center was built in response to requests by the Western Kentucky Horseman's Association, **Purebred Livestock Associations and** various friends of Murray and Western Kentucky. The facility was renamed in honor of its first director, William "Bill" Cherry, in 2006. The Cherry Expo Center complex is made up of a multi-purpose event facility that consists of a 23,000 square-foot dirt floor arena with graduated seating for 2,714; an 8,647 square-foot staging area with a 6 stall wash rack; a 100 seat classroom; 20 station RV electrical hookup area; and dedicated detached 40 stall barn. Since the initial dedication, over 500,000 individuals have attended a wide array of events.

STUDY ABROAD IRELAND MAY 12-22, 2015

One characteristic of a Murray State graduate is to have some understanding of cultural diversity and alternative economic and political systems. On May 12-22 Hutson School of Agriculture students participated in an agricultural and cultural tour of the Republic of Ireland. The experience abroad was the culmination of an international study course taken by 25 undergraduate and graduate students during the spring semester. Students visited various agricultural production and processing units to interact with owners and managers. Examples include a peat bog, Mannion's sheep and suckler cow farm, Fernville Connemara Stud, Joyce's Mountain Sheep Farm, Pallaskenry Agriculture College, O'Leary's dairy farm, Old Jameson Distillery, Ardsallagh cheeses, Coolmore Stud, Teagasc Tillage Research Center, Griffin's potato farm and processing facility, and Troytown Grey Abbey Equestrian Hospital. Students also visited Kylemore Abbey, the Cliffs of Mohr, the Ring of Kerry, Blarney Castle, Rock of Cashel, Trinity College, Christchurch Cathedral, and the Guinness Store House. In addition, participants were treated to a sunset kayaking tour on Killarney Lakes, an overnight stay in the Kilkenny Farm Houses, and an evening of traditional Irish music and dancing at the Merry Ploughboy.



Fall 1994 - Fall 2014




