Learning Contract

The Commonwealth Honors Academy will provide room, board, instruction, and most recreational opportunities at no charge (other than the \$250 tuition processing fee) to the undersigned students. The Academy will award six hours of university credit, three hours of credit in a humanities course and three hours in an elective course.

One vital instructional component of the Academy is the viewing of foreign language films. Students who have had little or no previous exposure to foreign language films may at first find some of the material presented to be unusual, controversial, or difficult to understand. As scholars, we feel that it is the responsibility of the faculty to introduce students to works that are considered by experts to be artistically significant. The students' accepting attitude toward a variety of artistic expression is an essential component of intellectual growth in the humanities.

I agree to abide by the rules and regulations of the Commonwealth Honors Academy. I will remain in the Academy from June 4 to 25, 2022 (unless special leave is granted for such causes as illness or emergency) and will participate fully in the academic and co-curricular activities.

Students who complete the academy will, along with their family, have the opportunity to return to the MSU campus on a Saturday during September to reunite with the CHA community, complete an evaluation, and receive a certificate of recognition.

Law, safety, and common concern for the total community govern the program's few non-negotiable rules.

- Willful behavior that is consistently abusive or demeaning to other members of the community, or that interferes with the academic or enrichment goals of the Academy, will not be tolerated.
- Willful abuse of campus, community, or another individual's property will not be tolerated.
- Willful behavior that is potentially harmful to an individual or community is prohibited.
- Criminal behavior, such as deliberately pulling fire alarms, activating sprinklers, or bringing firearms to campus is not tolerated.
- Student automobiles or other vehicles are prohibited, as is riding in unauthorized vehicles, or leaving campus for unauthorized trips.
- Drugs, including alcoholic beverages, are not allowed.
- No open flames are allowed inside buildings (e.g., candles, incense burners, lighters etc.)

All of the above regulations will be firmly enforced. **A student will be dropped from the Academy and sent home for violation of any of the above regulations.** No university credit will be awarded.

Interdisciplinary Humanities and Fine Arts

Please read the course descriptions below. You will be asked to rank the six classes 1-5 (1 is your most desired choice – 5 is your least desired choice).

Culture, Identity, & Conflict

The aspects of culture that define us as individuals can also be the very aspects of our identities that can drive us apart. In this course students will focus deeply on conflict resolution through the humanities, why humanities and liberal arts education is crucial for broadening perspectives, and how we can learn to love one another, even when our views don't align. Students will read short stories and a book of their choice, analyze nonfiction testimonials and speeches, conduct interviews, discuss and journal, and create final projects that propose practical solutions for conflicts that are plaguing modern society.

Speak Out Loud! Finding Power in Your Words

- "Spoken words have power beyond measure."
- Debasish Mridha

Speaking to the world starts with speaking to a room. This course will focus on the art of the spoken word. Students will learn how to take their ideas from the page and transform them into professional, eloquent, and effective oral presentations. Content will include both the study and practice of speaking to a group of people. This will take place in a safe, supportive environment where students are free to articulate their individual ideas and where they will collaborate with others to find power in their words.

Peace without Resolution

As its title suggests, this course presents a variation on this year's CHA theme, "The Art of Peaceful Resolution." Typically, when we discuss "peaceful resolution," we discuss conflict resolution, nonviolence, and the relaxing of tensions. Our interdisciplinary study of fiction, film, drama, and poetry, however, will invite students to consider art that makes peace with what we cannot readily resolve. From the most enduring philosophical and religious questions to our most mundane, everyday concerns, we routinely encounter problems with no right answer, paradoxes that we cannot unravel, and ambiguities that only make us more uncertain as we puzzle through them. For instance, in Yaa Gyasi's 2020 novel *Transcendent Kingdom*, the narrator, Gifty, asks a question that will preoccupy us throughout the course: "What's the point of all this?" "Our curiosity around this issue," she explains, "has sparked everything from science to literature to philosophy to religion. When the answer to this question is 'Because God deemed it so,' we might feel comforted. But what if the answer to this question is 'I don't know,' or worse still, 'Nothing'?" Although none of us are likely to discover what "the point of all this" is in one lifetime, let alone one three week college course, we will nevertheless sharpen our capacity to ask, reflect upon, and reconsider the kinds of questions that resist ready-made answers. Through daily, student driven discussions, a sequence of short essays and creative assignments, and a wide range of texts including plays (Shakespeare's King Lear, Beckett's Waiting for Godot),

poetry (by Emily Dickinson, Wendell Berry, and Li-Young Lee), short fiction (by James Baldwin and Octavia Butler), a novel (*Transcendent Kingdom*), and a film (Paul Schrader's *First Reformed*), we will work together to develop our capacities for peace without resolution.

Why can't we all just get along?

Human history is full of incredible feats of cooperation and altruism. Even the most ancient of human societies sought to limit, control, and provide alternatives to casual violence. Today we encounter exceptionally low levels of direct violence in our day to day lives, and even seek to limit instances of bullying and verbal attacks. Yet, we achieve incredible rates of death from violence in warfare. Even recent history presents numerous examples of human genocide, with human cooperation and ingenuity deployed to massacre entire populations based on little more than their physical appearance or perceived ethnic loyalties. This class will examine this paradox using anthropologic and historic resources. We will look at the different ways in which societies have sought to limit and control violence, while encouraging cooperation and altruism. How is it we are simultaneously so good and so bad at getting along with each other?

Being in the room where it happens: Finding resolution

In this IDHFA course, students will learn how to 'write their way out' while looking at literary and historical examples of resolutions, both peaceful and not. Together, we will attempt to work out ways situations could have been resolved for the better with our words and why it is, exactly, that those words matter so much. During the course we will consume both classic and contemporary literature, as well as a foray into theater with Hamilton. Students will compose works of both creative nonfiction and fiction in an attempt to provide peaceful resolution to both their own problems and the problems of the world.

Elective

Please read the course descriptions below. You will be asked to rank the six classes 1-5 (1 is your most desired choice – 5 is your least desired choice).

Use Your Words: Podcasting for a Peaceful Resolution

Words. We hear them, and we read them every day. Words can uplift or words can hurt. In this class, you will learn how to tell stories through podcasting and multimedia storytelling. You'll learn about a new method in journalism called "complicating the narrative" that will seek to restore trust in journalism through conversations with the public. You'll learn how to interview, listen, and empathize as you examine responses to some of the polarizing issues in today's society. By the end of the course, you'll have your own podcast, multimedia stories, and social media.

Re-Imagine the Everyday: Visual Art

This course is based on artistic experimentation, visual analysis, collaboration, and invention. Students will work independently and as a team to create artworks that reflect personal experiences and re-imagines everyday objects. We will begin the course with visual analysis, learning how to read artworks and dig for deeper meaning. As we continue, students will work independently on an ongoing art-journaling project to channel self-expression into a visual format using collage and drawing. For our service project, our class will collect various items from the Murray State area (botanical and organic material, litter, and other discarded items), taking care of our surrounding environment to culminate in imaginative found-object sculptures.

Eating around the World

This course provides an introduction to multiple different cultures through food. You will learn to appreciate perspectives different from your own. By learning about, preparing, and eating food, you will travel the world and experience traditions, beliefs, and customs of others. From Europe to Asia, this course will broaden your palate and your mind.

Seeking to Design for Resolution

Is design a personal talent of creativity or a social process of empathy and iteration? Why are some companies so successful with their products and others forgotten? How do we design *organizations* and *objects* with consumers in mind? These are the questions that guide the CHA course on design. We employ a design-thinking process to everyday objects, the local community, and school structures in this course that allows students the space to think deeply on how organizations and objects are created. Our service-learning component will let students apply their knowledge of design-thinking to solve problems in

the community with local organizations. Specifically for this summer, we will examine how empathy is crucial to peaceful resolutions and organizational challenges.

Mindfulness 101 and Empowered Leaders

This engaging, hands-on and active course is designed to develop personal well-being through mindfulness practices, and guide participants to use their personal mindfulness skills in leadership roles. Personal reflection and mindful group games will be used to facilitate mindful personal growth. Then, participants will engage in group activities and mindful games to discover that those that model mindfulness in their leadership roles are more effective and empowered leaders. Participants will create action plans for personal and leadership growth, and in groups, participants will come to consensus on a service learning project that embodies mindful leadership. Examples might include creating video lessons on mindful practices for a targeted audience, or designing a proposal to present to administration at their respective schools delineating the need for, and plans to create, a mindfulness group. Participants will leave this course with improved personal mindfulness practices, and as empowered leaders in their schools, and ultimately in their desired fields.
